UA HOSTS BEST SYMPOSIUM YET

UA hosted the 26th Annual Graduate Student Symposium on February 26, 2021 via Zoom, organized by Dr. Jennifer Feltman. Probably because of the pandemic, it had a much larger than usual turnout. 16 papers were presented by MA students representing seven schools (UA, UAB, UGA, FSU, Tulane, U. Chicago and U. Houston). Seventy people attended the student presentations. The keynote lecture was delivered by Yale's Prof. Jacqueline E. Jung and 250 people attended the lecture from the U.S., Canada and Europe. 





HIGH MUSEUM ACQUISITION

Five photographs by Assistant Professor Allison Grant have been acquired by the High Museum of Art, Atlanta, for their permanent collection. Grant won the Atlanta Photography Group's (APG) *Portfolio 2020* purchase award, and APG donated the works to the High Museum. Three of the five photographs will be on view through August 1, 2021, in the High's new exhibition, "Underexposed: Women Photographers from the Collection," in a new acquisitions gallery.

RESTORING FRENCH STONES

Assistant Professor Dr. Jennifer Feltman was recently appointed to a new team of the *Chantier scientifique Notre Dame – Sculpture décorée*: 14 international researchers who will study the sculpted



décor of the fire-ravaged Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris. After the historic monument was engulfed in flames in April 2019, Feltman joined a grassroots organization of international experts involved in the cathedral's restoration, the Scientifiques au service de la restauration de

Notre-Dame de Paris, for which she made a study of its painted sculptures. Feltman is the only non-French citizen on this team, led by Prof. Dany Sandron of the Université Sorbonne. "I have previously been on the team focused on stone materials, but this new team has been developed to focus specifically on stones that were carved and often painted," Feltman said.

PRINTAUSTIN PODCAST

Instructor and alumnus John Klosterman was one of only five artists out of 90 international printmakers selected for the juried exhibition, *Contemporary Print: 5x5*, sponsored by PrintAustin and Big Medium, for the artist festival PrintAustin 2021, in Texas. As part of being selected, Klosterman was featured on Studio Noize Podcast with host and fellow printmaker Jamaal Barber in an interview about his studio practice and approach to art. Klosterman discussed how he finds a meditative practice in the physicality and labor-intensiveness of making woodcuts. In his practice, he builds multi-layered mixed print media works that reveal powerful narratives about his experience and struggles with anxiety and OCD.

UGA SITE INSTALLATION

Associate Professor Pete Schulte's new site-specific work was installed at the University of Georgia's Plaza Gallery as part of the Dodd Galleries' ongoing *Wall Works* series in February. Schulte's *Untitled (Plaza)* consists of two wall paintings that exist, as Schulte describes them, "in simultaneity, as twins and opposites."

Schulte's drawing, *Untitled*, graphite and ink on paper, 12 x 12 inches, which was exhibited in *Properties of Dust and Smoke*, *pt. 2* at McKenzie Fine Art in New York in 2019, has been reproduced on the cover of *Centre*, the new record album by the "heavy winding psychedelic" rock band, Mt. Mountain, from Perth, Australia.

QUILTING PAST CRIMES


Associate Professor Sarah Marshall's fabric work, Past Crimes, was juried into the *27th Parkside National Print Exhibition*, University of Wisconsin-Parkside, by juror John Hitchcock, professor of art at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Her work (seen above) combines screenprinting, relief printing, cyanotype and dye-work in a roughly two-foot square quilt.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

Professor Jason Guynes and a team of artists recently completed a unique mural in a new downtown Tuscaloosa hotel lobby.

ART FACULTY, ALUMNI AND STUDENTS CREATE INNOVATIVE HOTEL MURAL IN TUSCALOOSA

The 21-feet-high-by-36-feet-wide wall in Homewood Suites by Hilton features familiar UA campus motifs, but with a distinctive twist: the towering image of Denny Chimes, with a pattern of houndstooth and dramatic clouds behind it, is created in sgraffito, an ancient technique dating back to classical Greece and popular during the Italian Renaissance on the facades of buildings. It's less common on a large scale today. Guynes and his team, including sculpture professor Craig Wedderspoon, alumni Jonathan Lanier (BFA 2019) and Ringo Lisko (BFA 2020), and current and incoming art majors Britt Guynes and Bella Guynes, worked together to create the sgraffito mural. They applied layers of plaster tinted in contrasting colors to a moistened surface and then scratched or chiseled the surface to reveal parts of the underlying layers or the red brick surface of the lobby wall and create the image.
