INTERNATIONAL AND NATIONAL STUDENT RESEARCH

Four Art and Art History Seniors Win UA ASSURE Grants

Seniors Aubrey Dettman, Samantha Norris, Alyssa Serena and Braxton Smith were awarded UA ASSURE (Arts & Sciences Support for Undergraduate Research) grants to support their senior research projects.

AUBREY DETTMAN, an engineering and art history major, used her ASSURE grant to travel to two historic archives and museum sites in New York to research the 19th-century artist Thomas Cole. She discovered that Cole dabbled in engineering and that no one has researched his inventions or engineering explorations. In Cole's journal at the archives, Dettman found his designs for a rudimentary hydraulic crane, years before a patent was published in the US. Dettman presented her research at UA's 2024 Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity (URCA) Conference, the Undergraduate Poster Session at the UA/UAB Annual Graduate Symposium in Art History, and the Hunter Museum of American Art Undergraduate Symposium in Chattanooga.



SAMANTHA NORRIS, a BFA studio art major in ceramics and sculpture, used her ASSURE grant to research ceramics and felting techniques for her thesis exhibition titled "Moth Holes." Norris' work focuses on her relationship with her younger self. "I channel [my] memories into ceramic work consisting of sculptural pieces made through an innocent lens." She built four large ceramic sculptures, incorporating hundreds of needle-felted "moths" made from animal fibers to suggest children's toys, conveying innocence. Norris presented her research at UA's 2024 URCA



Conference and won the Conference Award for Excellence and Achievement. She also exhibited in the 2024 Bachelor of Fine Arts in studio art thesis group exhibition in the Sella-Granata Art Gallery.

ALYSSA SERENA, a BFA studio art major in digital media and painting, used her ASSURE grant to develop her thesis exhibition "Shadows, Spirits, and Echoes," that uses video, photography and painting to explore "situational and relational factors in the development of an individual's sense of self." Serena presented her work in the 2024 Bachelor of Fine Arts in studio art thesis group exhibition, in UA's Sella-Granata Art Gallery.

What We Did on Our Summer Vacation!

During May Interim, twenty-seven lucky University of Alabama students spent fifteen days in Italy studying art history and studio art. Professors Jason Guynes, Allison Grant and Dr. Rachel Stephens led the group on a study tour of historic art and architectural sites in Rome, Siena, Florence and Venice. They were able to study up-close iconic sites including the Roman Forum, St. Peter's Basilica, Florence Cathedral, Uffizi Gallery, the Piazza San Marco and the Doge's Palace.

More than half of the students who traveled were art history or studio art majors; the rest were majors from fields ranging from communications, creative media and interior design, to philosophy, public health and environmental engineering. Join us in Spain in 2025!



Works by William Dooley Featured at ASFA

In February, William Dooley, director of the Sarah Moody Gallery of Art and associate professor of drawing, showcased his paintings in a three-person exhibition, "Similar but Different," at the Vulcan Materials Gallery at the Alabama School of Fine Arts (ASFA) in Birmingham.

AAH Hosts First International Art History Symposium on UA Campus

Art historians Dr. Tanja Jones, Dr. Doris Sung, and Rebecca Teague organized and held the 2024 symposium, "Challenging Empire: Women, Art, and the Global Early Modern World," March 1-2, 2024, at UA, the Birmingham (AL) Museum of Art, and online, the first international art history conference hosted on UA campus. Developed from their ongoing digital project *Global Makers: Women Artists in the Early Modern Courts of Europe and Asia*, the symposium showcased cultural production by and for early modern women – particularly those associated with the courts – on a global scale. Sixteen leading scholars representing national and international institutions presented their research during the two-day event. The symposium was supported by the Samuel H. Kress

Bethany Moody Named Artist-in-Residence for Studio By The Tracks

Bethany Moody, a full-time instructor in UA art studio foundations, was selected to be the spring artist-in-residence for Studio By The Tracks (SBTT) in Birmingham, a nonprofit art studio that serves adult artists with autism spectrum disorder. Noting the uniqueness of SBTT's programs, Moody said, "As a neurodiverse person, it can be challenging to find communities where I feel a true sense of belonging, where I can deeply connect with people and build relationships that feel enriching and sustainable." Moody was awarded Best in Fine Art Crafts in the 2023 Robin Nance Metz Art Competition at Shelby County Arts Council, Columbiana, AL, and has exhibited her work nationally and regionally.

AUM Hosts Celestia Morgan Solo Exhibition

Wade MacDonald Wins South Arts Career Grant

Assistant Professor Wade MacDonald was awarded a South Arts Career Opportunity Grant in May and will use the funds to attend an invitational artist residency, *Digital Clay*, at Watershed Center for Ceramic Art in June. The first of its kind, the residency will bring together 30 ceramic artists from around the US who are developing and implementing digital approaches to clay.

Rachel Dobson to Retire

Rachel Dobson, the department's communications specialist, will retire this summer after more than twenty-five years at UA, twenty-three in art and art history. After working at *Alabama Heritage* and the UA Press, Dobson was hired as the art department's slide curator in 2001 just a few years before



the world shifted from analog to digital technology. As teaching resources changed, Dobson stopped making slides and found other ways to be useful. She started an in-house news flyer that branched into an online monthly newsletter and a 16-page magazine (The Loupe) that covers department activities each semester. In 2011, her title officially changed from slide curator to communications specialist and visual resources curator, recognizing her work on the department's library, website and social media accounts, including a 6,000+ online photo collection on Flickr. com and two book collections totaling more than 2,500, cataloged on LibraryThing.com. As her job description morphed over the years, Dobson said, she learned many of the skills needed for her work through UA's staff training courses and by pursuing master's degrees in art history and in library and information studies at UA. "As the world and our work changed, my department and my professors always supported my learning while working. I'll always be grateful for the opportunities to learn on this campus."

UA's Graphic Design Program Named GDUSA Top Design School

In May, *Graphic Design USA* included UA's Department of Art and Art History graphic design program in its list of Top Design Schools. *GDUSA* is one of the oldest graphic design organizations in America. UA AAH student accolades have been gaining other national and local attention this year:

- The February 2024 issue of *Graphic Design USA* included two UA BFA graphic design majors in their "Students to Watch" feature: Katelyn Daniewicz (BFA 2023) and senior BFA major Darrell Shelby.
- Four students in Assistant Professor Jonathan Cumberland's graphic design classes have been recognized for their work in the 60th GDUSA Annual Showcase. Katelyn Daniewicz (BFA 2023), from Northport, AL, won for her "Foxfire" Logo. Katie Nebbia (BFA 2023), from Buffalo, NY, won for her design of a mobile website for "Fuku Ramen." Senior Andy Nguyen, from Madison, Ala., won for his design of a mobile website for "Viet Huong." Junior Reese Yarbrough, from Alabaster, Ala., won for her "Hive Mind" brochure. The students are all BFA graphic design majors.
- Closer to home, three BFA graphic design majors brought home local ADDY awards in December. Reese Yarbrough won the Gold ADDY and Best in Show for Book Design for "The Virginian." She also won the Silver ADDY and the Judge's Choice Award for Editorial Design for her "Baldessari Interview." Andy Nguyen won the Silver ADDY for Book Design for "Thirteen Ways of Looking at a Typeface." Junior Jacey Wieter won the Silver ADDY for Collateral/Brochure design for "Pool: Skill, Strategy, Community." In addition, in the professional category, Jonathan Cumberland won the Silver ADDY for Illustration for his "Brilliance of Fire" for The University of Alabama National Alumni Association.
